





- **Incarcerated parent(s)**




Immediate Enrollment

- School of origin = school last attended when student was permanently housed or school where last enrolled
- Enroll in school immediately even if lacking required documentation:
- *Birth certificate*
- *Medical or immunization records*
- *Proof of residency*
- *Previous school records*
- *Proof of guardianship*





**EMERGENCY EVACUATION OF SCHOOLS
EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS; FIRE DRILLS; INCLEMENT WEATHER**

A. CRISIS AND EMERGENCY

The Board of Trustees recognizes its responsibility for the safety of students. Crisis and emergency situations, man-made or natural disasters, can occur without warning. Such emergencies are best met by preparedness and planning.

*The Board directs the Superintendent to establish a Development Committee to develop a plan to be used by District schools in responding to a crisis or emergency. **The plan shall comply with the requirements of state and federal law.** The Development Committee shall include at least one member of the Board; at least one site administrator; at least one licensed teacher; at least one employee; at least one parent or legal guardian; at least one representative of law enforcement; at least one school resource officer, and at least one representative of a state or local organization for emergency management. The Development Committee may also include a counselor; a psychologist; a social worker; a student in grade 10 or higher; an attorney or judge.*

The Development Committee shall develop a plan to be used by the schools within the District in responding to a crisis or emergency. The Committee shall consult with:

- a. Local service agencies and local law enforcement agencies, and*
- b. The Director of the local organization for emergency management.*

The plan shall include, without limitation, a procedure for:

- a. Assisting persons within the District to communicate with each other;*
- b. Assisting persons within a school to communicate with persons outside the school, including, without limitation, relatives of students and employees, the news media and local, state or federal agencies responding to a crisis or emergency;*
- c. Immediately responding to a crisis or emergency and for responding during the period after a crisis or emergency has concluded, including a crisis or emergency that results in immediate physical harm to a student or employee of a school;*
- d. Assisting students, employees, and relatives to move safely within and away from the school, including a procedure for evacuating the school and a procedure for securing the school; and*
- e. Enforcing discipline within a school and for maintaining a safe and orderly environment during a crisis or emergency.*

The plan developed by the Development Committee shall be presented to this Board for adoption, and the once adopted, the plan shall be reviewed annually. Notice of the adoption of the plan shall be effectively communicated, and students and staff shall be provided training.

The principal of each school shall establish a School Committee to review and implement the plan. Membership on the School Committee shall include the principal, two licensed employees, one non-licensed employee, a school resource officer, if the school has such an

officer, and one parent or legal guardian. Membership may also include a school counselor, school psychologist, licensed social worker, representative of law enforcement, and a student in grade 10 or higher if the school includes grade 10 or higher. The School Committee shall meet annually to review the plan, and in conducting its review, the School Committee shall consult with local social service agencies and law enforcement agencies and the Director of the local organization for emergency management. If the School Committee determines that the school should deviate from the plan, the committee shall notify the Development Committee and request its permission to deviate from the plan. The Development Committee shall notify the Board of any deviations from the approved plan.

The plan and deviations are confidential and must not be disclosed to any person or governmental agency or political subdivision.

B. FIRE DRILLS

The Superintendent shall develop procedures for the handling of school emergencies, which include a plan for the prompt and safe evacuation of schools, which shall be practiced once each month as in fire drills, earthquake drills or lock-down drills conducted in accordance with Nevada Revised Statutes.

C. INCLEMENT WEATHER

The Superintendent shall develop an Inclement Weather procedure for closing, delaying the start, or dismissing schools early. This procedure is intended to protect the health and safety of students and staff; therefore, it shall outline rules for proper and timely notification of staff, parents and students. The notification procedure shall outline how notifications will be communicated and include a deadline for all communications regarding school closure or delayed start.

~~The Board recognizes that its responsibility for the safety of students extends to possible natural and man-made disasters and that such emergencies are best met by preparedness and planning.~~

~~The Board authorizes a plan for emergency action which shall ensure that the health and safety of students and staff are safeguarded, the time necessary for instructional purposes is not unduly diverted, minimum disruption to the educational program occurs, and students are helped to learn self-reliance and trained to respond sensibly to emergency situations.~~

~~All threats to the safety of the schools shall be identified by appropriate personnel and respond to promptly in accordance with the plan for emergency preparedness. The threatened school shall be evacuated in the event of a bomb threat when in the discretion of the building principal it is believed advisable to do so.~~

~~The Superintendent shall develop procedures for the handling of school emergencies which include a plan for the prompt and safe evacuation of the schools which shall be practiced once each month as in fire drills, earthquake drill or lock-down conducted in accordance with law; the immediate notification of appropriate administrative personnel whenever any employee becomes aware of an emergency or impending emergency; cooperation with such local agencies as the Sheriff's office, Fire Department and civil defense authorities; and the continual evaluation of the effectiveness of emergency planning in preparing the schools to cope with disaster.~~

~~The Superintendent may close the schools, delay the opening of schools, or dismiss school early for emergency reasons and to protect the health and safety of students and staff members, and shall prepare rules for the proper and timely notification of concerned persons in the event of such emergency closing.~~

~~In the case of an extreme emergency, and where less than one hour's notice of impending crisis is afforded, children and staff members shall be retained at the schools. Parents who wish to pick up their children may come to the school building to do so.~~

~~In any such instance of the early closing of schools, the Superintendent shall notify the Board President immediately and other Board members as soon as is practicable.~~
